



Our Board of Directors met in October and spent several hours discussing CCC's purpose. This is going to lead us to new places and spaces. Churches are longing for an affirming camp to attend. We are excited about how God continues to open doors, and our goal this year is to pray for guidance and walk through those doors!

This home specifically works with kids that have been neglected and abused and exposed to different substances their whole lives. Fast-forward to 9 years later and they continue being one of my highlights in life. 

2023 UPDATE

Carolina Cross Connection connects churches to communities while making space for Jesus to transform lives through relationships.

Camper Numbers

2020: 0 campers, 2021: 524, 2022: 551, and 2023: 653. We are seeing steady growth in our camper numbers after COVID. We are grateful to partner with such incredible churches. We had eight brand new churches who all chose us because we are an affirming and diverse camp experience.

Strategic Partners

On top of our incredible partners in our Home Repair counties, Haywood Street in Asheville, and the Children's Homes in Honduras, we added a few new partners this year. One was Hood Huggers, which is a tour in Asheville that explains the Black experience and another in Asheville is Christmount Christian Assembly Retreat Center. Christmount allows us the opportunity to host more adult year-round experiences.

Reconciling Ministry

This year our Board voted to become a Reconciling Ministry. This means we adopted their stance on being open and affirming to all people who attend our camps. This is a national United Methodist Church organization.

Future Building


We received first-time grants from AARP and the Outer Banks Foundation and continued support from SECU, NC Community Foundations, and the Reynolds Foundation of the Western North Carolina Conference.

2022-2023 FINANCIALS

Financially, CCC is building back. Due to giving camper fees back in 2020 and below-average registrations in 2021 and 2022, we are building back our reserves. We must increase recruiting and Major Donors, Grants, and Cornerstone members to move forward to achieve the financial goals we have set for this year.

2024 STRATEGY

In 2023, we were allowed to work with Patton McDowell at PMA Consulting. This was a part of the grant given by SECU. They specifically helped us identify gaps in services in diverse areas in North Carolina and other states in the Southeast. They also gave us tools to help us continue to diversify leadership.

We also used this fiscal year to clarify our strategic plan for 2024-2027. The top 5 improvements are as follows:

GROWTH PLAN

CAMPER NUMERICAL GROWTH AND SUSTAINABILITY

Due to COVID, camper numbers have decreased. The goal is to achieve a 67% increase in overall camper participation over the next 5 years while ensuring that camper fees remain low.

This will require the implementation of creative and cost-effective camp rental partnerships.



EXPAND FUNDING TO MEET INDUSTRY STANDARDS FOR EMPLOYEES

We are currently 25% below national average salary average of religious nonprofits our size. The goal will be to make salaries and benefits competitive for all employees over the next 5 years.

This will require more grant writing, monthly donors and major donor involvement.



ADVOCACY & AWARENESS PROGRAM EXPANSION

In Asheville, our programming addresses systemic injustices, providing people of all ages with the knowledge and tools to initiate advocacy efforts. Previously limited to student groups, we now aim to expand by offering year-round retreats for diverse age groups.

Additionally, we've received inquiries to launch similar programming in other states.



DIVERSIFY ALL SERVICE AREAS

In 2023, utilizing a grant, we engaged a consultant to assess our service areas, specifically mapping programs like Cross Connection across diverse states.

The findings revealed a lack of racial diversity in most of our service areas. Our objective is to extend our presence into more underserved communities over the next 5 years while preserving our existing long-term relationships.



CREATE TRAINING RESOURCES

As we expand our service areas and diversify our staff, it's crucial to ensure that program participants are well-equipped to engage with diverse communities.

In the next two years, our plan is to develop advocacy and awareness training programs for all our service areas.
Additionally, we aim to conduct accessible and informative training sessions tailored for churches.

Grant Writing We are writing for and prayerfully expanding \$127,000 in grants for 2024.

Grace Nolasco has come on full-time to run our Honduras program and Social Media content creator/manager. We hope to use Social Media more effectively in our fundraising efforts.





Fundraisers

Our goal for this year's Benefit Dinner is \$36,000 and will be held at Cabarrus Brewing's Kettle Room on September 21, 2024.

Major Donors

We have incredible families who have given generously so that we can continue dreaming. Our goal this year is to expand that base by 10 families.





Cornerstone

We have 90 families contributing from \$5 - \$5,000 per month. We hope to expand that base by adding ten new families in the \$100 - \$200 per month range.
